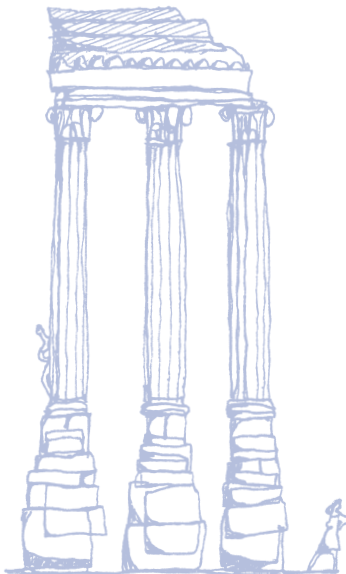

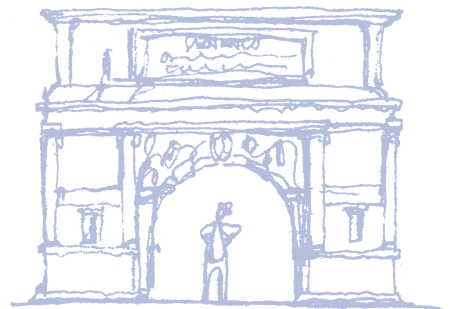

For the first time one of the most spectacular historical monuments in Rome will be opened for us for a Gala Dinner.

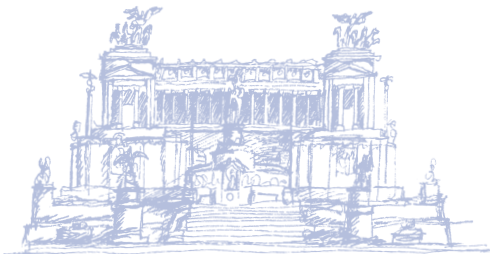
"Il Vittoriano" was built between 1885 and 1911 to celebrate Victor Emanuel II, King of the reunited Italy.
